The 31 BILLION DOLLAR "IKE DIKE" COASTAL BARRIER PROJECT <u>has been</u> <u>approved by the House of Representatives & is in committee in the Senate.</u> This proposes to construct a coastal barrier of dikes & gates that can be closed during a hurricane to protect Texas lives, property, & our invaluable Texas oil & petrochemical industries & jobs, plus our all-important medical center (that has flooded in past hurricanes). Brion Satthoff's Corner

Hello Lunar Fins family,

I hope everybody is enjoying a great beginning of their summer. While doing research on the ghost shark A while back I found something that piqued my interest It seems that deep sea organisms tend to grow larger than many of their cousins from the shallows. The reasons tend to remain a mystery but the phenomenon has been given the name Deep Sea Gigantism. I found a number of theories that tried to explain this phenomenon.

Kleibers Rule

LARGER ANIMALS ARE MORE EFFICIENT

Kleiber's rule states that animals that are larger will tend to be more efficient this can be demonstrated by comparing a whale to a small fish, The whale with a mass hundreds of times larger than that of the fish will have a greater metabolism, The smaller surface area to volume ratio gives the whale the advantage of conserving greater energy with less energy lost to the surroundings through heat. in the deep the food is scarce with most of the nutrients falling as marine snow- a trickle of organic debris from the shallower waters. Thus, food is scarce, so there is an incentive to conserve this energy into grow larger.

Furthermore larger animals have the ability to ingest larger prey. they will be more likely to survive environmental extremities or attacks from predators and are able to cover long distances in search of food or a mate reproductive success is also therefore aided by an organism being larger.

Bergman's Rule

SEA ANIMALS GROW LARGER IN COLD CLIMATES

Bergeron's rule states that sea animals tend to increase in body size with a decrease in temperature. this matches observations in colder regions like the Arctic deep, where some of the largest ocean creatures like Greenland sharks in giant sea spiders are found. The low temperatures lead to their cells growing larger by slowing their metabolic rate, the cold also means creatures in such climates have longer life spans.

Slowed metabolism's cause polar creatures to live in relative slow motion and the rich supply of oxygen found in cold water allows them to grow to gigantic sizes.

The Island Rule

DEEP SEA ISOLATION

In 2006, biologist Craig R McClain investigated the gradient from the shallows to the deep sea. His findings seem to mirror the framework of terrestrial islands, where these isolated areas of land develop indigenous biodiversity. More specifically, he found that the deep sea seems to mirror the Island Rule, an idea that small bodied life on islands grows much larger in its isolation than life on major land masses, due to limited resources, predication and competition. According to McClain the deep sea is functionally similar to an island.

The deep also has its limited resources, few predators, and is isolated from the shallows. It follows that the diversification of life in the deep mirrors that on islands-the isolated communities develop larger body sizes into response to the conditions stated above.

I found this to be a very interesting topic and anyone that would be interested would be encouraged to delve deeper into deep sea gigantism to learn more on their own as this article has just scratched the surface.



Everything we can expect from 'Avatar: The Way of Water,' the long-awaited sequel to the hit 2009 movie.

The sequel takes place over a decade after the events of the first "Avatar."



- A lot of the movie will be set underwater.
- The movie opens in theaters on December 16.

Director James Cameron has been discussing a sequel to "Avatar" ever since the original film opened in 2009 and became the highest-grossing movie of all time ("Avengers: Endgame" took the title in 2019).

The powerful sci-fi movie is set on a far-away moon called Pandora and follows human Jake Sully (Sam

Worthington) as he befriends the natives (called the Na'vi) by using a genetically engineered Na'vi body. Now, the sequel picks up over a decade later and will focus on Sully, his lover Neytiri (Zoe Saldaña), and their new family.

Along with Worthington and Saldaña returning for the sequel, we'll also see Giovanni Ribisi, who was the lead corporate administrator of the human-mining project on Pandora in the first movie.

Two actors whose characters died in the first movie will also be returning. Sigourney Weaver, who played Dr. Grace Augustine, is coming back, <u>but not playing the same character</u>. Stephen Lang, who played the villain Colonel Miles Quaritch, is also getting a second chance.

But there are also newcomers. Kate Winslet will be teaming up with Cameron for the first time since <u>she</u> starred in his other major blockbuster hit, 1997's "Titanic."

Winslet is set to play a <u>free diver named Ronal</u>, one of the Na'vi who inhabits the waters of Pandora called Metkayina.

Cliff Curtis ("Blow," "Training Day," "Whale Rider") will play Tonowari, the leader of the Metkayina.

Edie Falco and Michelle Yeoh have been cast for live-action roles. And Vin Diesel <u>said in a 2019 Instagram</u> <u>post</u> that he will also be joining the cast. However, there are no details yet on who he will play.

As the title suggests, we're going to see more of what goes on below the surface of Pandora in the sequel.



To pull off these scenes, a massive 900,000-gallon perfomancecapture tank was built in New Zealand for the sequels.

Like the first movie, the technology used to make "Avatar: The Way of Water" is groundbreaking.

Along with filming underwater, Cameron and the special effects team at Wētā FX developed a <u>motion-capture underwater system</u> to capture the performances.

The equipment has never been used before this movie and <u>took a year-and-a-half to develop</u>. And, like the first movie, Cameron plans the push the boundaries of 3D to present "the most immersive 3D available," he said at <u>2022 CinemaCon</u> via a video message.

"We're pushing those limits even further, with 3D with high dynamic range, with high frame rate, higher resolution, and a much greater reality in our visual effects," he said.

Here are the dates for the third, fourth, and fifth installments in the franchise:

- "Avatar 3" December 20, 2024
- "Avatar 4" December 18, 2026
- "Avatar 5" December 22, 2028

The Texas Gulf Coast Council of Diving Clubs (TGCC) plans to award four College scholarships (1 @ \$500) during 2022. These scholarships are given in memory of Jack Allyn, Greg Grimes, Jean Himes, Anne Millioud. Clint (Dwight) Moore, John Petty and Michael Szewczyk, Randy Widaman and Dick Zingula; deceased members of our dive community. It is also awarded in in recognition for support of the TGCC Scholarship Program by Alicia Grimes, the Houston Underwater Club and the Houston Underwater Photographic Society and Linda Petty. The purpose of these awards is to support the members who support the dive clubs in the Texas Gulf Coast area. The awards will be paid by TGCC directly to the college towards tuition.

Eligibility Rules:

- 1. Scholarship applicant must be a college undergraduate or graduate student attending college in 2022, or a high school senior that has been or will be accepted to college in 2022.
- 2. The applicant, the parent(s) (biological or through formal adoption), or the grandparent(s) of the applicant, must be an individual member of TGCC or a member of a TGCC member club with dues current in 2022.
- 3. Application (see other side) must be received by the TGCC Donations Committee prior to **June 30, 2022**. TGCC will review all completed applications on July 1, 2022.
- 4. Applicant shall have the high school/college furnish a transcript of grades, courses and class standing.

Scholarship General Guidelines:

- 1. Scholarship decisions of TGCC are final.
- 2. Scholarship winner is expected to keep TGCC abreast with his/her progress in college.
- 3. TGCC reserves the right to not award a prize depending upon the number of entries and qualifications of the applicants.
- 4. A personal interview with members of the TGCC Scholarship Committee may be required prior to awarding this scholarship.
- 5. Confirmation will be by e-mail. Make sure phone and e-mail data provided is current.
- 6. TGCC is offering this scholarship as a reward to TGCC members, TGCC member and associate clubs or the children of these members to thank them for supporting TGCC's efforts in promoting safe sport diving. The committee will take into consideration the applicant or applicant's parent's involvement in TGCC and member clubs and/or the diving community in general throughout the year.
