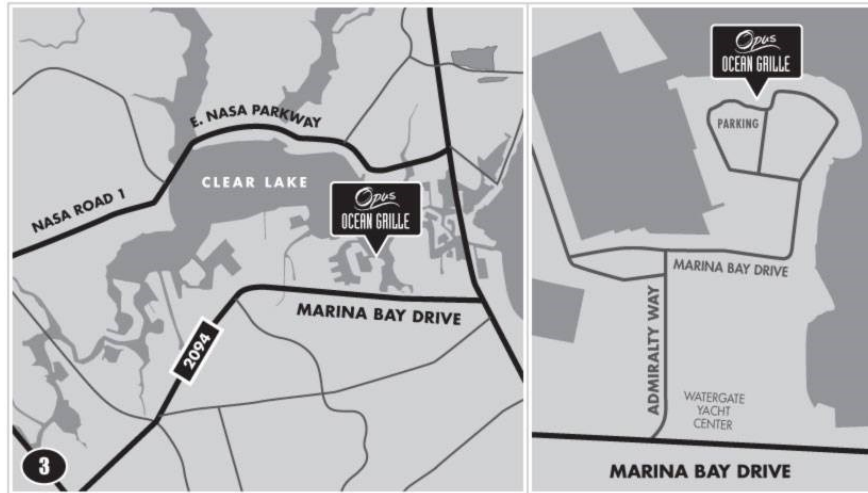

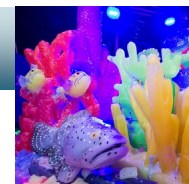

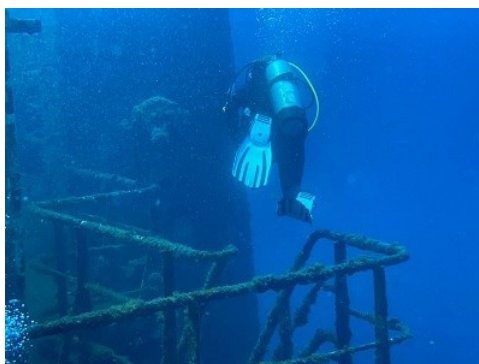

George Clark's Corner



As possible signs of a deadly coral disease appear near Texas shores, scientists spring into action

David Sanchez, senior biologist, flips on a light to take a look at coral species in a quarantine tank at Moody Gardens Thursday, Sept. 29, 2022 in Galveston. Signs of a disease have shown up at the Flower Garden Banks marine sanctuary in the Gulf, which is home to a lot of otherwise very healthy coral.

Scientist Michelle Johnston braced for years for a moment she hoped would never come. A month ago, she got the first hint it might have happened: Divers in the Gulf of Mexico national marine sanctuary she works to protect noticed lesions on some of the coral.

The dead spots on the vulnerable coral raised alarms because they could indicate the area off the Texas coast has been infected with Stony Coral Tissue Loss Disease. Researchers first identified it in 2014; the disease then swiftly killed coral across the 360-mile Florida Coral Reef.

Coral worldwide already suffers from climate change. The disease in Florida, called stony coral tissue loss disease, affected almost half the stony coral species there, according to the state. More than 80 percent that got it died.

Brion's Corner



Hello everybody I hope you are enjoying this cooler weather I know I am. I like to put in ocean and diving DVDs to play in the background anytime my grandchildren are visiting. I found one that Jim Carmin had left me on giant Manta rays and Micah and I watched it. It was really interesting so I thought that I would read up on Mantas and share some of the information.

MANTA RAYS

The name manta is Portuguese or Spanish for mantle (cloak or blanket) they are also known as devilfish because of their horn shaped cephalic fins which are thought to give them an evil appearance.



Rays are basically flattened sharks and mantas are different than most rays because they are very large in size. they don't lie on the ocean floor (ocean going) Mantas have the highest brain to body mass ratio of any fish and they have the largest brain of any fish.

They have highly developed brains and are capable of long-term memory, they are able to map their environment using sight and smell. They are known to approach and interact with humans. In 2016, scientists published a study in which manta rays were shown to exhibit behavior associated with self-awareness. In a modified mirror test, the individuals engaged in contingency checking an unusual self-directed behavior.

Mantas track down Prey using visual and olfactory senses. Manta and Devil rays are the only rays that have evolved into filter feeders. As I mentioned rays are basically flattened sharks. evolutionarily sharks are a very old group that appeared in the Ocean 350 million years ago, and for a long time they were the only cartilaginous fish. During the Triassic period most sharks became extinct worldwide as the oceans became less productive with a food source. A number of million years later sharks reappeared and that is when rays also appeared. Of the rays' mantas are the most recent. They appear in the fossil record about 20 million years ago. Few fossils have been found as their cartilaginous skeletons do not preserve well, only three sedimentary beds with a manta fossil are known. One is in South Carolina and two in North Carolina. The remains of an extinct species have been found in the Chandler bridge formation of South Carolina. Mantas evolved from bottom dwelling sting rays, eventually developing more winglike pectoral fins and losing their barbs.

There are two species of Mantas:

1. M. Birostris the larger one migrates across open oceans singly or in groups and can reach 2980 pounds and 23 feet wide their width is about 2.2 times the body length
2. M. Alfredo tends to be resident and coastal and reaches 18 feet wide. M. Birostris also has a remnant of the sting Barb in the form of a caudal spine. The mouth of most rays is on the underside of their head. On mantas the mouth is on the front for filter feeding. They normally have a Chevron coloration. They are typically dark on top with pale markings on their "shoulders". Underneath they are usually pale or white with distinctive dark markings that are as unique as fingerprints.



Brion's Corner (Continued)



A pink manta has been observed in Australia's great barrier reef near Lady Elliot Island. Researchers believe it is a genetic mutation causing erythrism (an unusual reddish pigmentation in animals) it is the only known pink manta in the world. Mantas have been known to dive to depths of 1300 feet the Chilean devil ray dives to nearly 6600 feet.



Mantas may live as long as 50 years; Female mantas appear to mature at 8 to 10 years.

The gestation period is thought to be 12 to 13 months and most mantas only have pups every two years. Mantas are found in tropical and subtropical waters in all the world's major oceans and also venture into temperate seas. The furthest they have been recorded from the equator is North Carolina and the north island of New Zealand. The greatest threat to manta rays is overfishing. Because of their long-life spans and low reproductive rate overfishing can severely reduce local populations with a little likelihood that individuals from elsewhere will replace them. Another issue is the demand for their Gill rakers has recently entered Chinese medicine and is growing popular.

In 2019 the reef manta was listed as vulnerable and in 2020 the giant Manta as endangered. In 2011 mantas became strictly protected in international waters because of their inclusion in the convention on migratory species of wild animals. Other threats or factors that may affect manta numbers are climate change, tourism, entanglements in nets and lines, pollution from oil spills and the ingestion of micro plastics. There is just so much more on the subject way too much to put in this article.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is seeking public input on a proposed regulation change to prohibit the harvest of oysters in Carlos Bay, Mesquite Bay and Ayres Bay (Mesquite Bay Complex). By closing the Mesquite Bay Complex to oyster harvest, ecologically sensitive and unique oyster habitat would be conserved for future generations. Additionally, the department is considering temporary closures in Galveston and San Antonio Bays to protect oyster restoration projects.

CCA Texas supports the TPWD proposal to close the Mesquite Bay Complex to oyster harvest and the temporary closures of restoration areas in Galveston and San Antonio Bays.

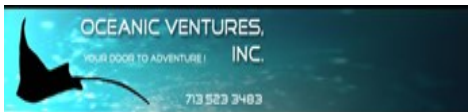
