Brion's Corner

Hello all,

Happy New Year, I hope everyone had a safe holiday.

I went diving with Jim Carmin the day after Christmas at Mammoth Lake. The water was about 68°. Vis was 10 to 12 ft. It was nice and warm topside so it made for a good dive day.

While we were down there Jim noticed about a 3 foot long paddle fish which are generally extremely elusive. we followed it along The bottom for about 40 feet until it realized we were there and disappeared off into the dark unfortunately we did not get any video of it but it was worth the dive. I've been diving there for years and that's the first one I've ever seen. After the dive Jason came by to visit with us and I was showing him these multicolored strobes that I bought for Kim and myself that attach to our BCs. He brought up a good question. What about sharks? Would this make them curious? That made me curious so I started researching sharks and colors.

I am no scientist and barely an amateur Marine biologist so please don't take what I have found as hard fact. From everything I have researched nobody is 100% sure of sharks and their habits. I am always open to corrections it never hurts my feelings.



DO CERTAIN COLORS ATTRACT SHARKS

To completely avoid wearing bright colors while in the water seems like a silly thing to do when the risk of being attacked by a shark is ever so small. In fact the risk of becoming separated from your boat or your group or lost at sea is much higher. Therefore wearing bright gear could help make you more visible for rescue.

Most vertebrates have two main types of photo receptors rods and cones, rods are highly sensitive cells that can detect very small amounts of light but they do not discriminate color. Cones are activated by larger amounts of light but they allow discrimination of different wavelengths of light i.e. colors. True trichromatic color vision comes from having three different cone photoreceptors detecting wavelengths in the red, green and blue ranges, specific colors are interpreted by the degrees of activation of these three photo receptors.

There were experiments done across sections of retinal tissue from sharks where they used microspectrophotometry, they tested the isolated photo receptors taken from 17 different species of sharks measuring the wavelength of light each was able to detect. Each shark species was found to have only a single rod photoreceptor that captured a single wavelength of light, and no shark had more than a single cone photoreceptor. In fact, in 10 of the 17 shark species they were unable to find any cones at all!

That means that the shark species have little or no ability to discriminate colors.

Among the different species of shark, the wave lengths of light detected by their single cone photo receptors are varied across a wide range. The ideal wavelength for a given species is determined to a large degree by the depth in which they live. longer (red) wavelengths of light are quickly lost with increasing ocean deaths while shorter blue wavelengths penetrate more deeply. Shallow water species therefore often have photo receptors detecting redder light while deeper species have photo receptors detecting predominantly blue wavelengths, they also note that deeper species might benefit from a blue range photo receptor to help them see bioluminescent deep water animals who usually emit a light in the blue range.

In 2011, the University of Western Australia and the University of Queensland studied several Australian shark species and the potential for their vision to be in color, they discovered the same thing, sharks only have one cone type which indicates that sharks cannot see color.

The 2011 study showed that it wasn't color that mattered but more contrast.

Sharks can see stark contrast between colors or patterns. According to scientists most sharks have very keen vision, especially the deeper water sharks. They believe bull sharks have poor vision which is why they bite more often.

The Ichthyology department at the Florida Museum of natural history compiles and tracks information regarding wet suit and gear colors worn by divers involved in unprovoked shark encounters (bites) statistics indicate a higher occurrence of shark encounters involving divers wearing typical black wet suits with contrasting colors such as white silver or yellow. For example 23% of divers involved in a encounter reporting wearing yellow white or silver is a contrasting color as opposed to only 6% reported wearing colors such as brown or rust.

In certain conditions bright colors provide a stark contrast to colors in the surrounding area, which makes a diver or a swimmer more visible, bright colors may also create confusion in some sharks between a human and its natural prey. As such neutral or Bland colors may be best for wet suits and gear.

Also to the shark fish scales have a reflective metallic appearance underwater, anything a swimmer or diver wears that mimics such an appearance can attract sharks, watches jewelry metallic fabric and similar attire can reflect light near the surface of the water leading sharks to believe prey is nearby. George H. Burgess, biologist at the Florida Museum of natural history advises divers avoid wearing watches jewelry or other exposed light reflective gear. I know a lot of our gear is stainless steel or has nickel plating etc. and I have always focused on having what I consider the best and most reliable as opposed to economy and looks when I choose my gear, but in the future I will also factor in contrast and reflective properties when choosing additional gear.

In closing I would like to say thank you for taking the time to read my long winded article, I had planned on doing it on color and light but during my research I realized this is very extensive subject so I will save the light part of the article for another time.

I would also like to thank my dive buddy Jim Carmin, he always tells me he's got my back and I honestly do know that or I would not dive with him, I just never realized that all that contrasting black and yellow he wears might make for a good decoy. I will make sure that he goes on the MV Fling with me next time I'm out there. (I'm just kidding my brother) God bless and a safe and prosperous year for everybody.

Coral in the Gulf of Mexico are facing an extreme threat. Here's how Moody Gardens is trying to help.

GALVESTON — Brooke Carlson checks in at least once each shift on the nearly 100 refugee coral at Moody Gardens. Scientists rescued them in recent years from Florida, where a disease is swiftly killing colonies. Zoos and aquariums nationwide took them in.

The coral is the hope for one day building back the reef.

The Florida coral in Galveston now live in three large, blue tanks. Carlson and the team make saltwater for them to live in, stir together refrigerated and frozen food to eat, and monitor how they respond to LED lights that mimic the sun. The process involves both caring for and learning about them; at least one species has never been in captivity before.

"These animals didn't choose to be here," said Carlson, squeezing their liquid lunch into the tank with a turkey baster. "As a keeper, my job is to give them what the ocean would, which is a very big task."

That so many corals were saved and so many facilities offered to look after them shows how important scientists felt the effort was. Coral worldwide already suffer from climate change. The disease in Florida, called stony coral tissue loss disease, affected almost half the stony coral species there, according to the state. More than 80 percent that got it died.

But the success story in saving some also gave way to further concern. Galveston researchers realized the disease might come closer to home. The Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary near Texas has some of the healthier coral that remain. The coral are deep in the Gulf of Mexico and roughly 100 miles off the coast, which might protect them, though it also makes them harder to help.

Stony coral tissue loss disease spread quickly. People first identified it in 2014 in Florida. It went on to infect coral along the entire 360-mile Florida Coral Reef, which curls along the bottom tip of that state. Scientists hoped the disease wouldn't reach Dry Tortugas National Park at the westernmost end. It did. That sounded alarm bells at Flower Garden.

Officials with the sanctuary, which is like an underwater national park with protections for the marine life there, put together a plan for what to do if the disease arrives. They've prepared to monitor its spread; remove smaller, sick colonies with chisels; and treat larger colonies with antibiotic putty pressed on with gloved fingers.

The biologists hope never to have to pick which coral colonies to save, but protecting all of them from the disease would be impossible.

"It is spreading everywhere," said Michelle Johnston, a research biologist with the sanctuary. "We're just highly concerned that the time is ticking."

Scientists aren't sure what exactly causes the disease, or how it spreads. Sanctuary divers are trained to spot the telltale white lesions. They've also shared webinars on what to watch for with operators of the boat that often takes out tourists. Divers are asked to disinfect their gear. Mariners are supposed to be careful with how they replace ballast water, which is held within ships to stabilize them, as it may be a source of the spread.





FIRST DIVE THIS MONTH—

Lunarfins Club Plans Active Diving Season

Underwater exploration and other aspects of oceanography will be the focus of this year's activities by the MSC Lunarfins skin and Scuba diving club. In addition to weekend trips to lakes and ocean areas, Lunarfins have planned classes in the use of Scuba gear, swimming and competitions in underwater hockey.

The season's first group dive will probably be in Canyon Lake near San Antonio later this month, and during the summer months at least one trip per weekend to the Gulf is planned. Most Gulf dives take place around oil rigs located 12, 20 and 30 miles offshore. Several Lunarfins are planning a diving trip to the Florida Keys and to the Grand Bahamas during the first week of June.

The spring Scuba diving course will begin March 13 and will be completed in time for the spring diving season. Class enrollment is limited and anyone interested in taking the course should contact Jim Peacock or Hugh Scott.

Fins. diving masks and snorkels are the only devices used by club members in playing underwater hockey. The game is played by moving a small brass puck along the bottom of the pool with a short hockey stick. Players have to rely upon their breath-holding power to compete.

Underwater hockey enthusiasts meet each Thursday evening at the Tropicana Club pool on Telephone Road. Scuba club members from Texas Instruments and Schlumberger have been competing with the Lunarfins, and planning for a summer underwater hockey league is underway.

The Lunarfins recently sponsored a 90-minute Scuba diving film produced by the US Divers Company which featured diving activities in British Honduras. The film was introduced by Luther Swift of the Gulf Coast Council of Skin Diving Clubs.

Lunarfins next meeting will be on March 15. All members, propective members and persons interested in diving sports are invited.

Lunarfins elected officers for 1967 at the February 15 meeting. New president is Fred Toole, 1966 vice president. Toole has been a Lunarfins member since 1965 and has represented the club at the Gulf Coast Council of Skin Diving Clubs. Paul P. 
