# **Pete Hunter**

Pete was born on May 24, 1942, in Brooklyn, NY. The family moved to Texas in 1954 when his dad was transferred with Todd Ship Yards. At the time he was the oldest of 5, and his dad wanted them out of Brooklyn. At the time he was already a half year ahead of kids his age and with this move put him another half year ahead. He turned 17 a week after graduating from Pasadena High School in 1959, it was tough being 2 years younger than most of the kids in your class.

San Jacinto College was not built at the time and the University of Houston was not state-supported. His parents could not afford college so that October he joined the Air Force. Finally, he was stationed in Newburgh, NY. He was an aircraft control and warning operator. Pete was involved with the Cuban Missile Crisis.

Pete met Norma (wife) in 1961 while she was at a college about an hour away. Norma's roommate was engaged to an airman and one night he brought Pete. They were married on May 11, 1963, 60 years the next month.

He worked for Stauffer Chemical and Lyondell/Basell, he retired when he turned 59. During those years he worked hard to get his college degree, took which 10 years while raising two boys. His degree was a Bachelor of Business.

After both boys were put through college, he finally had time to pursue his dream of diving.

## John Harvey — 2023 — Art Car Parade



Yeah, I know, this doesn't have anything to do with diving, but I've put another Art Car Weekend in the bag; a lot of work completed, and a lot of partying done. It is the original, it's the biggest, it's the oldest, and it's the best Art Car Parade in the country. I am tired, but I would not have missed it. I get to see some people I only see once a year, others I only see every few

years, and meeting some others I have not met before; it is always an experience.

I originally learned about Houston's Art Car Parade back in the late '80s while hanging out with the other skaters ... the infamous Urban Animals. The first (and curiously, the last) Art Car Parade I watched was 1989; back then it was put on in conjunction with one weekend of The Houston International Festival. The next year I worked as a volunteer to help put it on, and have been at it ever since.

Back then the parade route started on Allen Parkway and finished at Market Square, but that route only lasted another year or two. And that was before we had radios, so my jobs included running messages back & forth, and other Blue Team duties including getting the participants staged in their assigned order, then escorting, or valeting, several, sequential, vehicles through the parade route.

The next few years the route went around a few blocks inside the I-Fest, then back out Allen Parkway with an after-parade event across the bayou at the city's Parking Lot H over by Fondé Community Center. Eventually the route morphed to take a little more of downtown and all the way back out Allen Parkway to Shepherd, where the participants disperse to prepare for the next event.

Eventually I moved from exclusively working on the Blue Team, and began working check-in – Green Team – checking the entrants in, checking fire extinguishers, and other various short-lived assignments that caused back-ups and delays, then going to Blue Team to escort participants along the route.

That led to my being the Green Team Captain for many years, which led my being asked to be on the Parade Committee in 2000. Over the years I've also been on the Red Team ('the Rangers,' who get to handle all the little things that constantly go wrong,) as well as the Blue Team Captain a couple times.

Nowadays I'm pretty much just a Ranger (as the Red team was melded into the Radios) and spend much of the day working out in the hinterlands ... dealing with the support vehicles that trailer in some of the entrants. And recently the Parade Committee has been merged with the Parade Steering Committee, which generally means there are several more people at the meetings.

And the Art Car Weekend is a lot more than just a parade. The Art Car Weekend's general schedule of events starts on Wednesday evening with the Out-of-Towners Welcome Party and Packet Pick-up. That event always requires several wranglers to direct the parking.

Thursday starts early with The Main Street Drag, where several caravans of art cars travel around town, visiting schools and hospitals, where children get to see – and touch the art cars. For many of the artists this is their favorite part of the weekend, with the parade being almost anticlimactic for many of them.

Thursday afternoon and evening is The Sneak Peek at Discovery Green downtown. It is another opportunity for the public to see many of the art cars staged in and around the park. This event always requires several wranglers on skates to direct the parking on the promenade, sloped sidewalk, and on The Avenida De Las Americas in front of The George R. Brown Convention Center.

Friday morning has the Spring Branch Main Street Drag, similar to the one on Thursday morning, only going to another part of the Houston area. Friday night is The Art Car Ball at The Orange Show, a truly unique event (bordering on spectacle,) and in my humble opinion, it is something that should be attended at least once.

Saturday morning it is all-hands-on-deck for staging and setting up for the parade (it is a rain-or-shine event, and I've worked it all three times rain has been involved.) Parade staging starts at 9:00 A.M., and rolls at 2:00 P.M. sharp, with about 250, or so, Art Cars participating and several hundred thousand people lining the parade route to view it.


## John Harvey — 2023 — Art Car Parade (Continued)

After the parade some of the Art Cars end up at Market square for a post parade event, and in preparation for The Illuminated Processional (it's a processional, not a parade!) This is a Houston Art Car Klub event (HACK, as opposed to every other event being sanctioned by The Orange Show) where many of the vehicles with lights, as well as those that have fire involved get to display their vehicles in the dark while driving to several places around the city.

Sunday is the official wrap-up with a brunch and the awards ceremony at The Orange Show. The first-place awards, as well as some of the 'big' awards get a check to go along with a unique, artist-made trophy.

# <u>The Wreck of Santa Maria de Yciar</u>

#### Port Mansfield, Texas.



Padre Island is the longest barrier island in the world, measuring 113 miles from Corpus Christi to near Brownsville. Up until the late 1950s, you could drive the entire length of the island in less than half a day with a decent four-wheel drive vehicle. That option was blocked in 1957 when the Port Mansfield Cut was dredged. It gave the new port created at Red Fish Landing a convenient waterway into the Gulf of Mexico. The channel had been a dream of the Laguna Madre-locked locals for decades.

October 20, 1957, at 4 a.m. was the incredible moment that the

giant dredger dug out the last sand dune and cut the island in two. This formally created North Padre and South Padre Islands.

Bill Rapp, a Port Mansfield resident, was there for that moment and was elated that he was. He wrote: "You often dream of things and they come to pass, but for some reason you aren't there at the precise moment. BUT I WAS THERE when the Dredge Miami took the final cut out of the old Padre and the waters of the Laguna Madre went rushing into the Gulf of Mexico."

The Port Mansfield Channel was about nine miles long overall, running seven miles through the bay, and it cut through two miles of island mud flats and dunes to reach the sea. In fact, that was the common promotional mantra for the project heard frequently in Willacy County in the many years they lobbied Congress for the cut: "Give Port Mansfield access to the sea."

A lone boat with an outboard motor was the first to pass through the channel after the dredge opened the way. But this was just the first phase. The channel needed to be widened considerably, and this is when things got much more interesting as a discovery was made that changed much more than the island landscape.

In the dredging that continued one bright sunny afternoon, the mud and clay being sucked from the channel and spewed onto the banks suddenly brightened as silver coins began sparkling in the sunlight. Hundreds of ancient Spanish coins were being harvested from the bottom of the canal. The dredge had crushed an old Spanish Galleon, the classic sailing ship, buried there for four centuries. Work was stopped for a while and the coins collected.

Ensuing investigations revealed a story more dramatic than the dredging of the channel. The ship

that was discovered there was the Santa Maria de Yciar, one of four ill-fated ships carrying treasure that had set sail together from Vera Cruz, Mexico, in late April of 1544 on the way back to Spain. The king had ordered that the ships were to bring back 100,000 coins of gold and silver from Mexico for the Spanish treasury, but being a man who was wise with money, he ordered that his funds be diversified. Each ship would carry 25,000 coins so the risk was spread across all the vessels. The ships also carried some 300 passengers: priests, women and children, some soldiers and businessmen returning with fortunes of their own from New Spain, as Mexico was called then. Estimates are that



the ships carried the equivalent of about \$80 million in today's purchasing power.

A late spring tropical storm blew them off course, and the relentless winds pushed three of the ships across the entire Gulf, where they were crushed on the sandbars of Padre Island. Their hulls were pried open and their treasures spilled out onto the sandy bottom. In the centuries ahead Padre would be known as the "graveyard of the gulf" because of its location as the backstop of storms. The fourth ship limped into Havana but was so damaged it could not return to Spain.

The passengers were marooned and decided that they would walk to Tampico, where there was a known Spanish outpost. They mistakenly guessed that they could walk there in three days – but it was actually 300 miles of trudging across dunes and swollen rivers and coastal marshes with no food and little drinkable water. They were mostly picked off and killed by Native Americans, and only one badly wounded friar made it to Tampico to tell the tale. Another passenger, after crossing the Rio Grande, decided to return to the ships, and he was saved when the Spanish salvage ships came for the treasure.

The three wrecked ships – the Esteban, the Espíritu Santo and the Santa Maria de Yciar – all sat undiscovered for four centuries. The Esteban and Espiritu Santo were both found years later a few miles north of the Mansfield cut. Treasure hunters descended on them and had collected quite a fortune when the State of Texas took action and forced them to cease and desist operations and turn over their plunder to the state. But Texas had no law to protect its antiquities, so the Legislature quickly passed the State Antiquities Code in 1969. The state and the recovery company fought it out in court for years, and finally Texas paid them \$313,000 for their efforts and then placed the coins, anchors, canons and other artifacts from the wrecks in the Corpus Christi Museum of Science and History, where you can still see them today.

You can visit the Port Mansfield Cut by boat or car. Launch your boat in Port Mansfield and enjoy following the dream made real out to the sea. Or, drive to South Padre and take State Park Road 100 North to Beach Access 6. Get on the beach and head north for 30 miles and you'll be at the cut (four-wheel drive recommended). It's beautiful there, with great fishing, and a marvelous place for a picnic on the granite boulders of the jetties.

And if you're wondering if coins can still be found, Ron Mills, the executive director of Port Mansfield, told me that "within the past two years the channel was dredged to the deepest depths ever, at 23 feet between the jetties and 17 feet throughout the entire channel. During those operations there were no reported discoveries of new coins or other artifacts that may have pertained to the shipwrecks."

Sorry, treasure hunters.

#### REEF Surveyors: Be on the Lookout for Black Spot Syndrome in Carrbean Fishes

We are encouraging Tropical Western Atlantic REEF surveyors to be on the lookout for a skin condition that is affecting reef fish in the Caribbean. Black Spot Syndrome (BSS) affects many reef fish but can easily be observed on Ocean Surgeonfish, especially when they are pale in color. The black spots are usually on the fins and skin of the affected fish. In many cases, Black Spot Syndrome is caused by a trematode parasite, *Scaphanocephalus spp.*, which moves from marine snails to reef fish and ultimately into osprey, which consume the infected fish. Infections seem to be especially common in Bonaire and Curacao, although other areas with reported cases include St. Kitts and South Caicos, Turks & Caicos Islands. Divers and snorkelers who see surgeonfish affected by BSS are encouraged to take underwater photos or video to document and record the location. Request for Public Comments: Petition to Protect Endangered Rice's Whales in Gulf of Mexico

NOAA Fisheries is requesting comments on a petition for rulemaking to establish a year-round 10-knot vessel speed limit in the Gulf of Mexico and other vessel-related mitigation measures in an area referred to as core habitat by the petitioners. Rice's whales are protected under the Marine Mammal Protection Act (MMPA) and are listed as endangered under the Endangered Species Act (ESA).

NOAA Fisheries received the petition pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act from the Natural Resources Defense Council, Healthy Gulf, Center for Biological Diversity, Defenders of Wildlife, Earthjustice, and New England Aquarium. The petitioners are requesting that we utilize our authorities under the ESA and MMPA to establish a "Vessel Slowdown Zone" to protect Rice's whales from collisions with vessels and noise pollution.

NOAA Fisheries seeks public comment on the petitioner's request. NOAA Fisheries is not issuing a proposed rule at this time. NOAA Fisheries will consider all comments and available information when determining whether to accept the petition and proceed with rulemaking.

# SHOOTING UNDERWATER VIDEO FOR DUMMIES AND NOT-DUMMIES

# THREE VIDEO WORKSHOPS ANNOUNCED FOR BEGINNING TO INTERMEDIATE VIDEOGRAPHERS

Three one-hour workshops will be held starting May 20 from 2-4 pm at Bayland Community Center. All three sessions will be in person and via Zoom for any participants that can't make it to the inperson presentation.

## CONCEPT:

I really want to keep this simple but practical. The three sessions will only deal with how to take good video clips underwater. They will not deal with editing and assembly into final films. The premise here is that if you are capable of reliably taking decent video footage, the editing and film assembly becomes a lot simpler and a whole lot more fun and satisfying. The surprising thing about UW video is that it doesn't have to be a black art. There are some simple practices that are easily taught and somewhat easily practiced that will make a night and day difference in results you achieve.

Yes, this is geared toward beginners and intermediate videographers but there are probably pointers that will be valuable even for the grizzled veterans of the 'deadly red button on the back of the camera'.

Session one will be spent on one topic: ACHIEVING GOOD COLOR UNDERWATER

Session two will cover: HOW TO TAKE STABLE UW VIDEO CLIPS

Session three will cover: TAKING VIDEO THAT IS CRITICALLY IN-FOCUS (plus other short topics)

Since there will be a variety of video systems that people will be using, time will be spent discussing how to best get reliable results from action cameras, point and shoot systems, and higher end SLRs. Following the presentation, questions will be fielded for answers and discussion.
