
ABCs of Fish ID

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

As always, diver safety and protection are our highest priorities. Thank you for your continued support as we work to provide coverage for all divers.




It was nice to come out of the water after diving and be dry!

I will need to dive more in my drysuit to get comfortable with it.



True Stories Worth Reading



A 9-year-old boy's dream of a pet octopus is a sensation as thousands follow Terrance's story online.

The boy's family in rural Edmond, Oklahoma, humored him with toy versions of an eightlegged mollusk, but as Cal got older it became clear that only the real thing would do.

The child's father, 36-year-old dentist Cameron Clifford, researched the possibility with a local aquarium store and before long Terrance the California two-spot octopus, also known as a bimac, was living in a watery enclosure at the family home southwest of Oklahoma City.

"We really like to encourage our children's interests," said the older Clifford. "It's magical to see a kid embrace their dreams and bring them to fruition. Cal has been infatuated with the natural world and with marine biology since he was very little."

A popular <u>TikTok saga was launched</u> with the father narrating the tale of Terrance the cephalopod, using a faux British accent generated by the social media app. Eventually, hundreds of thousands of people were following.

Within weeks, the tale took an surprise twist when it was learned Terrance was actually a female as it laid some 50 eggs that the family initially assumed were unfertilized. Several weeks after that, teeny near-transparent octopus babies began hatching and were given names like Rocket Larry, Squid Cudi, Swim Shady, Jay-Sea and Sea-Yoncé. Cal had burst into tears at the family dinner table when his father first announced that the local aquarium store had told him adopting an octopus would be possible.

Father and son together researched what was needed, deciding on a saltwater tank and water cycling system and ensuring they would be able to source food for the soft-bodied sea creature.

The family's younger son Lyle and mom Kari also joined the project in their own ways. A family friend who is a reptile scientist has provided support and advice.

While female octopuses usually die soon after laying their eggs, Clifford said Terrance remains alive four months later.

Clifford said the family has gained much from the experience.

"Aside from the physical, financial and emotional requirements of owning a species such as a bimac, you will learn a lot about yourself in the process," the Arizona-born Clifford told TikTok followers in his app-generated accent. "There's always some valve or seal that's not completely closed, and your storm-resistant carpet isn't rated for gallons and gallons of seawater. You'll learn that seawater and electricity don't always get along."

"You will learn new things and meet incredible people and will learn that wildlife is magnificent," he added. "But most of all, you'll learn to love a not-so-tiny octopus-like Terrance."

For those of you who do not have or read Facebook, I want to share a true story I read this morning.


In December 1984, a group of 3,000 beluga whales were trapped by ice in the Chukchi Sea, near Russia. The whales were confined to small open water ponds surrounded by thick, impassable ice up to 10 feet thick in some areas.

Without access to larger areas of the ocean, the whales had difficulty breathing and were at risk of dying. To help rescue them, an icebreaker named Admiral Makarov was brought in, equipped with a specially reinforced ice-breaking hull. The ship attempted to take the whales to safety by breaking the ice, but the belugas initially refused to follow.

When the crew began playing classical music like Tchaikovsky over the ship's speakers, the whales finally began to follow the Makarov through the narrow open-water channel. This allowed 2,000 whales to reach the unfrozen ocean after a journey of almost 100 miles.

The successful rescue effort lasted several days and was later dubbed "Operation Beluga." It was a massive undertaking that involved several countries, including the Soviet Union, the United States, Canada, and Japan.

14,000 Year Old Rhodoliths Discovered in FGBNMS



Rhodo-what? Rhodoliths, also referred to as algal nodules, are rocks made of hard, crustose forms of algae.

The word rhodolith is of Greek origin with rhodo- meaning rose colored and -lith meaning stone-- rose colored stone or red rocks! This is the perfect description for these important habitat builders found in the <u>mesophotic zones</u> of the sanctuary. Rhodoliths accumulate into beds and are associated with high levels of biodiversity.

Rhodolith samples collected from 157–236 feet deep at <u>East Flower Garden Bank</u> and 338 feet deep at <u>Elvers Bank</u> were analyzed by The University of Alabama masters student Sarah Olmstead. Based on radiocarbon dating, she determined that these rhodoliths formed roughly 9,500 to 14,800 years ago!

Why is this significant? Rhodoliths and their slow growth rate suggests that recovery from ecological damage would not happen over human timescales. Their long timespan and carbonate structure may also be useful for climate studies.

Divers Alert Network

There has been much discussion in the dive industry about emergency exits on liveaboards. While we hope for smooth sailing, being prepared for the unexpected is key.

If an alarm sounds in the middle of the night, swift action is crucial. Know your exit route by heart, even in darkness, and don't hesitate for anything.

Q During the boat briefing, pay extra attention to exit locations, especially in sleeping areas. They might be tucked away, so familiarize yourself with them beforehand.

[©] Every second counts in an emergency. Skip the search for essentials by keeping a small go bag by your bed, packed with necessary meds, passport and travel documents, waterproof flashlight, whistle and phone.

Each night, restock your go bag so it's ready to grab at a moment's notice. Being prepared means peace of mind, even on the high seas.

Make sure your go bag is small (no larger than 2 liters) so it doesn't impede your exit. A solid clip lets you attach it to your belt loop or lifejacket, so your hands remain free. A dry bag will float and keep medications and documents dry. A brightly colored bag will be easier to find if you lose it.

An emergency evacuation is never expected but always a possibility.
