Diving the wrecks of Truk & Bikini Lagoons

Join us on March 17th at (Spring Greek Barbeque) for a photo journal of Dennis' and Tom's 2013 trip to Chuuk, Micronesia, home of the WWII ghost fleet of Truk Lagoon. The warm tropical waters of Truk Lagoon with its sheltering islands and reefs make it one of most accessible wreck diving locations in the world. The minimal currents within the lagoon make the wreck diving easy and perfect for u/w photography. We dove on 14 different huge WWII wrecks that were obviously losing the battle again – this time with Mother Nature. The sunken hulks are rusting away to oblivion but not before creating beautiful artificial reefs covered in beautiful soft corals and thriving fish populations. We took a ton of pictures – some of which are actually pretty good. Come see the audio/visual presentation sharing our experience with you.

The 2 nd part of the program features a historical perspective of the Atomic Tests at Bikini Atoll back in 1946. Mike Greuter traveled to the Marshall Islands to dive and photograph the deep warships that were sunk in Operation Crossroads. During the tests, two atomic bombs, Able and Baker, were used to study how much damage warships would take in a nuclear attack. See the final resting place for the mighty USS Saratoga, the Japanese battleship, Nagato, and 4 other wrecks resting on the bottom of the lagoon. Come and be prepared for an emotional roller- coaster ride that will make you laugh, wonder, and ponder the problems of living in the nuclear age. Mike will also talk to us about the equipment and procedures required to meet the challenges of diving deep wrecks.

This promises to be one of the most interesting, educational, and unique programs presented at HUPS in some time. Don't miss this one.



We need to be on the hunt for one of these guys!



Typically inhabiting tropical and subtropical waters, blue hairy frogfish are often found on coral reefs or amidst rubble and debris on the ocean floor. Their hunting strategy is as fascinating as their appearance. As ambush predators, they use a specialized lure called an esca, which mimics the appearance and movement of small prev like worms or shrimp. This deceptive lure attracts unsuspecting prey, which the frogfish then quickly engulf with its large, extendable mouth.

Unlike most fish, frogfish are not adept swimmers. Instead, they "walk" along the ocean floor using their pectoral fins, which much like legs. This unique mode of locomotion, combined with their ability to change color to match their surroundings, makes them nearly invisible to both predators and prey. The blue hairy frogfish is a perfect example of nature's ingenuity, showcasing an extraordinary blend of adaptation and survival strategies.

Fun Fact: Pufferfish release a toxin when they puff out that is meant to impair the attacker, so they can safely escape.

Ironically, this doesn't work on dolphins in the same way.. it actually gets them high. So they purposely inflate them and pass them around to their dolphin friends for fun.

The historic ship, the SS United States, set speed records and raised the bar for passenger ships of her time. She's languished with an uncertain future for a long time, and plenty of folks worried that she would be scrapped - cut up for steel recycling. So this new plan might give those folks hope that her legacy as the greatest, as the bar-raiser, will live on forever.

She's currently making 4.7kts southbound in the Delaware River, headed to sea! She will spend some time in a Mobile, AL shipyard to clean up parts that shouldn't be in the ocean and make her safe for scuba divers like YOU!

We're keeping close tabs on the ship because, if the timing works out, we want to bring the Fling there so we can carry divers to watch the sinking and then be the first to dive the reef!





The "Endurance" ship

continent: something no explorer in human history had — at that point in time — managed to do.

For a short while, it seemed as though Shackleton's voyage would end in success, not shipwreck. Thanks to its rounded hull, their ship — christened the Endurance — was able to work its way through thick layers of pack ice. The further the crew waded into Antarctic waters, the thicker this ice became. Before long, their ship was

In January of 1914, heavy winds caused the pack ice to compress, surrounding the *Endurance* from every direction. The crew attempted to hack their way through the ice, but when the ship failed to gain the momentum necessary to free itself, Shackleton decided that it was unwise to waste any more coal and manpower.

The expedition had come to a grinding halt. Its boilers extinguished, the *Endurance* was forced to wait for the ice to disperse naturally, which did not happen. Winds rose and temperatures fell further still, heralding a blizzard that continued into July. After getting stuck again, the ship's masts collapsed, and the bow was crushed.

On November 21, 1915, pressure waves crashed down upon the *Endurance*, causing the ice to separate. Unable to keep afloat, the heavily damaged ship sank into the depths below. Against all odds, Shackleton and his crew <u>survived the ordeal</u> and returned to civilization, but their trusted vessel had turned into a shipwreck and was lost forever.

The Endurance was discovered in 2022, this was the ship that Captain Ernest Shackleton tried to sail to Antarctica in 1915. Bound's discovery team started from Cape Town on a research and logistics vessel dubbed the *Endurance22* and set courses for the Weddell Sea. Once the icebreaker reached the point where the original *Endurance* was believed to have sunk, they used underwater search vehicles to locate the wreck, which had rested at depths of 3 kilometers for more than a century.

Thanks to environmental conditions, the *Endurance* was preserved extraordinarily well. "It would appear that there is little wood deterioration," Dr. Michelle Taylor, a polar biologist at the University of Essex, told the BBC, "inferring that the wood-munching animals found in other areas of our ocean are, perhaps unsurprisingly, not in the forest-free Antarctic region."

While many people would love a chance to see the *Endurance* in person, the wreck won't be exhibited in a museum any time soon. Doing so would violate the <u>Antarctic Treaty</u>, which was signed to regulate international relations regarding Antarctica, and which designates Shackleton's ship as a historic monument that cannot be removed from its current position.

The *Endurance* quickly became one of the most famous shipwrecks of all time, second only to the *Titanic*. So, let's do a deep dive (no pun intended) into the fascinating logistics of recovering centuries-old shipwrecks.

Review possible "Target Donation offers" to determine what types are appropriate for ACWA to be in the middle of. Establish procedures and guidelines for their evaluation and establish an ACWA decision making process. To what extent ACWA needs to examine the donor, the donor's intent, and the donor's donation target to being in accordance with the IRS's 501(c)(3) standards. What to do if the target donation is on ACWA's donation list, or not on that list.

Create and Maintain the "Target Donation" instruction list in ACWA's Operating Manuel.

At this time, I envision input from all these subcommittees being incorporated into an ACWA Operating Manuel. Copies of the Operating Manual would be made available to Board Members.
