Congratulations to JaVan and Pewee on their marriage. I hope for many happy years ahead of them.



Wreck of 2,000-year-old pleasure boat discovered off Egypt's coast

Underwater archaeologists announced Monday they had discovered the 2,000-year-old wreck of an ancient Egyptian pleasure boat off the coast of Alexandria.

Divers found the vessel's hull, which was more than 115 feet long and about 23 feet wide, submerged in the port of the island of Antirrhodos, the European Institute for Underwater Archaeology (IEASM) [said in a statement](#).

There was Greek graffiti on the vessel that "could date from the first half of the first century AD" and "supports the hypothesis that the ship was built in Alexandria."

The boat "would have had a luxuriously decorated cabin and appeared to have been propelled solely by oars," the Alexandria-based institute added.

Alexander the Great founded the city of Alexandria in 331 BC. A series of earthquakes and tidal waves that struck its coast submerged the island of Antirrhodos, which was discovered in 1996. Over the years, divers have recovered statues, coins and other treasures there, with some on display at the Greco-Roman Museum in Alexandria.

IEASM director Franck Goddio recently published a report on Antirrhodos and its Temple of Isis, based on underwater exploration carried out since the 1990s.

"It's extremely exciting because it's the first time ever that such a boat has been discovered in Egypt," [Goddio told the Guardian](#) of the latest discovery. "Those boats were mentioned by different ancient authors, like Strabo, and they were also represented in some iconography – for example, in the Palestrina mosaic, where you see such a boat of a much smaller size with noblemen hunting hippopotamuses. But [an actual boat] has never been discovered before."

Future research on the recently discovered wreck "promises to be a fascinating journey into the life, religion, wealth and waterway pleasures of ancient Roman Egypt," the institute said.

Alexandria is home to ancient ruins and historic treasures, but Egypt's second-largest city is especially vulnerable to climate change and rising sea levels, sinking by more than three millimeters every year.

Even in the United Nations' best-case scenario, a third of Alexandria will be underwater or uninhabitable by 2050.

Multiple shipwrecks have been found in the bay, including the wreckage of Napoleon's fleet from the [1798 Battle of the Nile](#). Earlier this year, a well-preserved boat measuring about 20 feet long was discovered by IEASM in the eastern harbor of Alexandria, according to a podcast [posted by the Hilti Foundation](#).

In August, archaeologists announced that ancient statues, Roman coins and other artifacts from Alexandria were [pulled from the Mediterranean Sea](#). The authorities said that the site may be an extension of the ancient city of Canopus, a prominent center during the Ptolemaic dynasty, which ruled Egypt for nearly 300 years, and the Roman Empire, which governed for around 600 years.





Battling Invasive Lionfish in the Gulf: Citizen Scientists Join the Fight

Four expeditions. More than 80 volunteer divers. Nearly 500 invasive lionfish removed from reefs in and around Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary.

In 2025, sanctuary scientists, partner agencies, and trained volunteer divers joined forces for a series of [Lionfish Invitational](#) research cruises in the northwestern Gulf of America. Conducted in partnership with Lionfish Invitational Inc., Texas Caribbean Charters, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, these citizen science expeditions give experienced divers a chance to support real NOAA research—while helping protect some of the healthiest coral reefs in the continental United States.

Across four expeditions between June and September, participants from more than 20 states and U.S. territories—including Texas, Florida, Massachusetts, Colorado, and the U.S. Virgin Islands—removed 465 lionfish from both sanctuary reefs and nearby artificial structures like oil platforms and the “Kraken” reef site. Researchers also collected 271 invasive regal demoiselles (*Neopomacentrus cyanomos*) and 14 angelfish for ongoing studies of non-native species ecology and population genetics.

While volunteers focused on removals, scientists conducted complementary research: collecting genetic samples from lionfish, swapping acoustic receivers to monitor fish movement, analyzing water samples for environmental DNA, and even testing for Gambierdiscus microalgae associated with ciguatera toxin. The data will help assess how lionfish are affecting native fish communities and reef health in the Gulf.

“Every lionfish we remove is one less predator consuming native fish and invertebrates,” said Rachel Bowman, lionfish cruise coordinator and president of Lionfish Invitational, Inc. “These trips not only contribute valuable scientific data—they also connect people directly to the sanctuary’s mission of resource protection.”

[Lionfish](#), native to the Indo-Pacific, were first reported in the western Atlantic in the 1980s and have since spread throughout the Caribbean and Gulf of America. With few natural predators and voracious appetites, they can consume over 100 species of reef fish and invertebrates, including commercially important snapper and grouper.

The 2025 invitationals were marked by strong participation, outstanding underwater visibility, and memorable sightings—including manta rays, sharks, dolphins, and sea turtles. Some new “traditions” even took root aboard the MV Fling, from pre-trip trivia to a new weather monitoring buoy affectionately named “Kevin.”

The success of this year’s four Lionfish Invitationals underscores how science, community, and stewardship come together to protect sanctuary ecosystems. Through collaboration with partners including Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Lionfish Invitational Inc., Texas A&M University, USGS, and others, NOAA is gaining new insight into the spread and impacts of this invasive species—and empowering divers to be part of the solution.



Huge undersea wall dating from 5000 BC found in France

French marine archaeologists have discovered a massive undersea wall off the coast of Brittany, dating from around 5,000 BC.

They think it could be from a stone age society whose disappearance under rising seas was the origin of a local sunken city myth.

The 120-metre (394ft) wall – the biggest underwater construction ever found in France – was either a fish-trap or a dyke for protection against rising sea-levels, the archaeologists believe.



The structure has lasted 7,000 years

When it was built on the Ile de Sein at Brittany's western tip, the wall would have been on the shore-line – between the high and low tide marks. Today it is under nine meters of water as the island has shrunk to a fraction of its former size.

The wall is on average 20 meters wide and two meters high. At regular intervals divers found large granite standing stones – or monoliths – protruding above the wall in two parallel lines.

It is believed these were originally placed on the bedrock and then the wall built around them out of slabs and smaller stones. If the fish-trap hypothesis is the right one, then the lines of protruding monoliths would have also supported a "net" made of sticks and branches to catch fish as the tide retreated.

With an overall mass of 3,300 tonnes, the wall must have been the work of a substantial settled community. And to have lasted 7,000 years, it was clearly an extremely solid structure.

"It was built by a very structured society of hunter-gatherers, of a kind that became sedentary when resources permitted. That or it was made by one of the Neolithic populations that arrived here around 5,000 BC," said archaeologist Yvan Pailler.

The monoliths that form the basis of the wall are similar to - but predate - the famous menhirs that dot the Brittany countryside and are associated with the Neolithic culture.

According to Pailler, there could have been a transmission of know-how on extracting, cutting and transporting the stones between older Mesolithic hunter-gatherers and incoming Neolithic agriculturists.

The wall was discovered after local geologist Yves Fouquet studied undersea depth charts drawn up using the latest radar technology. "Just off Sein I saw this 120-metre line blocking off an undersea valley. It couldn't be natural," he told Le Monde newspaper.

Archaeologists made their first exploration in summer 2022 but had to wait till the following winter – when the seaweed had died back – before they could map the wall properly.

In a paper in the International Journal of Nautical Archaeology, the writer's conjecture that sites such as this may lie at the origin of local Breton legends of sunken cities. One such lost city – Ys – was believed to lie in the Bay of Douarnenez, just a few kilometers to the east.

"It is likely that the abandonment of a territory developed by a highly structured society has become deeply rooted in people's memories," the paper says.

"The submersion caused by the rapid rise in sea level, followed by the abandonment of fishing structures, protective works, and habitation sites, must have left a lasting impression."

Doing a complete Pre-Dive Safety Check for yourself and with your buddy is an important step before every dive, whether it is your 1st dive or your 10,000th dive. It can help prevent minor inconveniences, as well as life threatening accidents.

Here is the breakdown for the pre-dive safety check:

B- BCD

W- weights

R- releases

A- air on, PSI check

F- Final OK (all gear, physically and mentally ready to dive)

There are many mnemonics devices you can use to remember, but here are some of my favorites:

-Begin with review and friend

-Because we really are friends

-Burger with relish and fries

-Because we really aren't fish


